
















Dear Colleague:

HISTORY

Ferris State University is recognized for its career-focused majors that give our students the education they need to meet the challenges of a changing economy. Founded in 1884 on the concept of providing students with marketable skills, Ferris was established by Woodbridge N. Ferris (1853-1928), a distinguished Michigan educator and politician who served two terms as the state's governor and was elected a United States Senator. Ferris was a private institute until 1950, when it joined the state higher education system. The college obtained university status in 1987.

LOCATION

Ferris State University's main campus is located in Big Rapids, a west central Michigan town of approximately 10,600 in the vacation-recreation region. In addition to being home of Ferris State University, Big Rapids is the county seat of Mecosta County. The 935-acre campus is readily accessible by the US-131 expressway and state highway M-20. Big Rapids is 55 miles north of Grand Rapids and within 200 miles of Chicago and Detroit.

ADMISSIONS

Current admission criteria for new students require all incoming freshmen students to submit ACT or SAT test scores along with official high school transcripts or official GED scores prior to an admission decision. Transfer students are required to submit official transcripts from all colleges attended as well as official high school transcripts and test scores to achieve a complete academic profile. Students fulfilling both university and program entrance requirements will be granted admission.

EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS

Ferris offers more than 200 educational programs through the Colleges of Arts and Sciences, Business, Education and Human Services, Engineering Technology, Health Professions, Kendall College of Art and Design, Michigan College of Optometry, and Pharmacy and through the offices of Extended and International Operations and Retention and Student Success. These programs lead to master, bachelor, and associate degrees as well as certificates. Master's degrees are offered specifically in Business Administration, Career and Technical Education, Criminal Justice, Curriculum and Instruction, Educational Leadership, Fine Arts, Information Security and Intelligence, Nursing, and Social Work. Ferris also offers a doctoral degree in Community College Leadership, Optometry, and Pharmacy.

Each college offers a cluster of related programs that are targeted to prepare students for specific careers, responsible citizenship, and lifelong learning.

FINANCIAL AID

More than 80% of the students presently enrolled in a degree-granting program at Ferris State University receive some type of financial aid through federal, state, institutional, private, and other sources including: scholarships, grants, loans, and student employment. Ferris State University awards more than \$177 in student aid annually.

Financial aid is primarily based on financial need and is intended to assist students whose families lack the total resources needed to pay for college. ATHLETICS

The Ferris State University Bulldogs are members of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA). Varsity teams compete in the Western Collegiate Hockey Association (NCAA Division I) in ice hockey and the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (NCAA Division II) in all other sports. Ferris student athletes participate in 17 varsity sports: golf, tennis, basketball, indoor and outdoor track, cross country, softball, soccer, and volleyball for women; golf, tennis, basketball, indoor and outdoor track, cross country, hockey, and football for men.

CENTER FOR LATIN@ STUDIES

The Center for Latin@ Studies (CLS) works to get students to college and through college by building on the strengths of students' culture and identity.

DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION OFFICE

The Diversity and Inclusion Office works with the entire Ferris State University community to support the mission and vision of the University, and to ensure that diversity, in its many forms, is understood, respected and valued. The Diversity and Inclusion Office at Ferris State University guides efforts to conceptualize, assess, and cultivate diversity as an institutional and educational resource.

More specifically, the Diversity and Inclusion Office will:

- Be a strong advocate for diversity and inclusion;
- Introduce diversity into the systems, structures, and culture of the University;
- Provide expertise and leadership on diversity and inclusion related matters, for example, faculty recruitment and retention issues, and the educational impact of diversity;
- Lead University-wide diversity planning and implementation efforts, resulting in a collaborative vision of diversity and inclusion;
- Help develop policies designed to improve the University climate;
- Identify strategies to enhance the compositional diversity profile of students, faculty, and staff;
- Provide resources and direction for infusing diversity into the curriculum;
- Offer annual assessment of the University's progress toward implementing a Diversity Plan;

- Help promote the University's core values and mission.

ENTERTAINMENT UNLIMITED

Entertainment Unlimited (EU), the campus programming board, is responsible for coordinating more than 20 student-produced events each year including educational speakers, comedy shows, films, novelties, and live music performances. The programming board is open to all students with general membership requirements.

CENTER FOR LEADERSHIP, ACTIVITIES AND CAREER SERVICES (CLACS)

This department assists students in preparing for their future career by engaging them in activities and leadership development outside of the classroom. Partnering with Student Affairs, the office provides opportunities for students to put their skills to use while planning events, leading registered student organizations, volunteering their time to help the community, and attending a variety of conferences and workshops. The Center for Leadership, Activities and Career Services offers six distinct resource areas:

The Career Services Center - assists students with career planning, career research, skills attainment, job search document preparation, interviewing, internships and job postings for success in the workplace. Students/alumni have access to Bulldog CareerLink, which is a state-of-the-art internet-based software package that allows students to write resumes, upload their resumes into the FSU Resume Book database, search and apply for employment/internship opportunities, and sign up for on-campus interviews and events. Career Fairs and on-campus interviewing opportunities bring over 250 employers on campus each semester.

The Leadership Center - helps students gain and use leadership skills through campus and community involvement. To keep students involved and connected to the University, there are more than 240 registered student organizations (RSOs), including sports clubs, Greek-letter organizations, spiritual groups, academic societies, and professional associations. Students have access to OrgSync, an internet-based software package that allows students to manage their achievements and student organization business. OrgSync also allows students to create and produce a co-curricular transcript that displays proof of their leadership and activities outside of the classroom. The end of the year Torchbearer Awards Ceremony offers emerging and seasoned leaders recognition for their efforts.

The Volunteer Center - works hard to refer thousands of Ferris students and community members each year to area agencies seeking volunteers. The volunteer center also engages students and RSOs in fundraising and donation efforts that support local, national and international organizations.

The Activities Center - provides a place to go when wondering what to do on campus. Multiple activities take place every day and the Activities Center staff will help you find something you enjoy doing. This Center also provides event planning assistance to all students to ensure a successful event. Homecoming, Bulldog Beginnings, Career Week, 5 Star speakers and more are coordinated through this center.

The Student Organization Center - helps to keep students involved and connected to the University. There are more than 240 registered student organizations (RSOs), including sports clubs, Greek-letter organizations, spiritual groups, academic societies, and professional associations. Students can find a suitable or fitting organization themselves or they can learn how to start a new one through this center.

The Greek Life Center - understand the long-held history and values of Greek organizations. This Center works to empower Greek organization members to continue the legacy. The Center offers recruitment information, support with activities, and plans Greek Week.

CORPORATE AND PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT, AND THE CENTER FOR CERTIFICATION TRAINING AND TESTING, Division of the College of Engineering Technology

<u>Corporate and Professional Development - CPD</u>

Corporate and Professional Development (CPD) at Ferris State University has been helping businesses develop solutions to training and industrial process needs since 1994. CPD partners with business and industry to address a wide range of issues by offering training programs in manufacturing, design and engineering, building sciences, plastics, welding, and other areas of need. These training programs can help a person gain professional certification on both a state and national level.

CPD offers

- Technical consulting by field-tested personal to assist business and industry with problem solving in many different areas, including applied research, and plant or office layout
- Custom training made convenient for clients through the flexibility of being on-site, off-site, digital, evenings, weekends, or some combination of these offerings
- Partnership opportunities with other companies facing similar training needs, thereby eliminating the need to postpone training due to low numbers
- Custom multimedia training that offers direct access to University personnel, resources, and expertise.

Center for Certification, Training & Testing - (CCTT)

The Center for Certification Training and Testing was founded in the early 1990s to administer the EPA-mandated Section 608 certification and testing program to HVACR technicians throughout the country. A technician's certification card with the Ferris State University logo, which they display each time they purchase refrigerant, is recognized and valued throughout the industry. The CCTT, through its state-of-the-art database, has the ability to administer testing programs for a wide variety of businesses. The CCTT offers

ECDS also offers assistance in making career choices. While finding the right career depends on several factors, two strong influences are personality and interests. Students can receive information in these areas by completing the Myers-Briggs Type Indicator and the Strong Interest Inventory assessments through the ECDS. A licensed counselor interprets the results with the student and provides information on careers that are aligned with the individual's personality, interests, values, and skills. EXTENDED AND INTERNATIONAL OPERATIONS

Through the activities of Extended and International Operations the impact and reach of Ferris extends beyond the main campus, an entrepreneurial view of business and curriculum development is cultivated, and support and direction are given to promote a global view for the entire Ferris community.

Ferris Statewide

For those students that are rooted in their home communities too far from the main campus to commute, Ferris operates off-campus locations throughout the state, often partnering with local community colleges. Currently totaling 21 sites, these locations deliver Ferris degree programs to students who would otherwise not have access to higher education.

Ferris Online

Ferris Online delivers online degrees, certificates, and courses that help students balance their personal and professional lives with their desire to learn.

Conference and Professional Services

The CPS team provides conference design and development consultation services that include planning, strategy, and implementation. To help ensure programs succeed, they assist with marketing and promotion, financial management, contracts, registration, site selection, facilities arrangements, on-site services, and evaluations.

Office of International Education

The work of the Office of International Education is to recruit and provide support to international students, coordinate Study Abroad and exchange programs, coordinate the Intensive English Program, facilitate an International Summer School, and sponsor programming that supports the University goal of becoming a globally diverse and aware community.

Latino Business and Economic Development Center

Ferris State University continues to connect with the growing Latino population in our West Michigan communities and the Latino Business and Economic Development Center's mission is to seek support for initiatives to spur economic development in those communities.

Community College Leadership Doctoral Program

The Ferris State University Doctorate in Community College Leadership empowers graduates to advance community colleges toward excellence and community responsiveness through exemplary leadership.

FERRIS LIBRARY FOR INFORMATION, TECHNOLOGY, AND EDUCATION (FLITE)

FLITE opened on March 12, 2001, as a premier research facility integrating modern technology with traditional information resources. Designed for flexibility and versatility, FLITE continues to adapt to the advancing digital age. The Library houses 172 public computers, including a Mac Design Center of eight computers loaded with design software; wireless connectivity; seating for 1,300 visitors; and 56 individual and group study rooms. Among its customer service attributes, FLITE contains an extended-hours study area and a family study room for visitors accompanied with children. Students using FLITE have access to laptop computers and scanners. An assistive-technologies laboratory facilitates the learning and research of students requiring special accommodations.

FLITE serves as a gateway to a variety of information resources available both on-site and off-campus in print and digital formats. FLITE houses a collection of more than 250,000 print volumes and provides access to online databases; reference resources; more than 81,000 electronic journals, newspapers, and magazines; streaming video; and over 200,000 ebooks. FLITE's new SmartSearch service allows users to search for information from most of these collections through a single Google-like search box. FLITE is a Federal Depository Library for U.S. government documents and a Patent and Trademark Depository Library. The Library's online catalogs and digital resources are available through the FLITE website at http://www.ferris.edu/library/. Interlibrary loan and document delivery services are offered to all faculty, staff, and students, including distance-education students, allowing users access to an immeasurable number of additional resources. Faculty, staff, and students can receive help using any library resource by phone, email, real-time chat, or SMS text. Individual research assistance is available upon request from subject-specialist librarians by submitting electronic request forms via the website. Faculty may also search and reserve titles in the "Media Booking" collection, which includes media resources for in-classroom use.

FLITE takes full advantage of advanced technologies to expand opportunities for teaching and learning. The Library contains four instructional studios equipped with 20-30 computer stations, an instructor's workstation, sound and projection equipment, TV/VCR, and DVD player. All instructional studios are "smart classrooms" and include a docucam. Additional equipment such as smart boards, laptop computers, and wireless microphones are available upon request. The instructional studios allow librarians and other faculty to teach the information-seeking and critical-thinking skills necessary to evaluate information resources. The information literacy program starts with the basics in the form of an adventurous active-learning activity in the Ferris State University Seminar (FSUS) courses. The online tutorial PILOT (developed at FLITE) provides instruction in library use and research to classes upon request of instructors. Additionally, FLITE has seven seminar rooms of various sizes to accommodate library instruction classes, meetings, and professional development activities.

FERRIS LIBRARY FOR INFORMATION, TECHNOLOGY, AND EDUCATION (FLITE continued)

The FSU Media Production unit is housed on the fourth floor of FLITE. Media Production provides assistance to faculty, staff, and students in the design, development, implementation, and distribution of media-related resources in support of Ferris instruction and activities. Activities range from videography to graphic design and production to creating DVDs from slide collections. FLITE is also home to the Faculty Center for Teaching and Learning, the Jim Crow Museum of Racist Memorabilia, and the Office of Multicultural Student Services.

HOUSING & RESIDENCE LIFE

Living on campus has proven to foster student engagement and improve overall student success. Ferris State University on-campus housing provides an environment that is clean, comfortable, safe and conducive to supporting the academic mission of the University. More specifically, living in the residence halls enhances and completes the learning that occurs at the University.

Student growth is enhanced through exposure to other points of view, experiencing diverse populations, and learning to live interdependently in a community of peers. Living with others can help residents develop coping skills and experiment with responsible decision-making in a safe environment.

A variety of housing and dining options give students the opportunity to create the environment in which they feel most comfortable. Amenities include wired and wireless internet connections in each residence hall, a choice of double or single rooms, the first-year experience and many other themed housing options. Cable television, available in every room, includes HD and movie channels. Washers and dryers are located on virtually every floor. Mail is delivered to each residence hall and each hall is equipped to provide a homelike feel with items such as board games, large screen televisions, overstuffed furniture and hall-sponsored activities.

Living in the residence halls is an educational endeavor. Our staff provides social and educational programming aimed at building cohesive communities on each floor. While our hall staff is in place to assist in maintaining community standards, residents are reminded that maintaining community standards is a shared responsibility.

The apartment community at our University consists of the west campus townhouses and the south campus apartment complexes. The west campus complex has 150 two-bedroom and 50 three-bedroom unfurnished townhouses that include a laundry facility in each complex. They are designed to provide a neighborhood-like atmosphere for families and single students alike. Families with children living in campus apartments are encouraged to use our playground, basketball courts and various walking paths.

The south campus apartment complex consists of 88 traditional one- and two-bedroom units. They are designed for single students and have laundry facilities in each building.

The East Campus Suites are neither residence halls nor apartments, rather this style of on-campus housing combines the best of both worlds. Each of the three 3-story buildings is home to 100 students. Exterior doors are locked 24/7 utilizing the same card swipe access and blue light/call box phone security system as our residence halls. Each building houses 24 four-bedroom suites and 2 two-bedroom suites. Every student has his or her own furnished bedroom and shares a full bathroom with one other student. A furnished living room and full kitchen complement the feeling of home each suite provides. With amenities such as air conditioning, garbage disposal, wireless connectivity, campus cable television, and more, the suites are sure to be a campus favorite for generations to come.

GENERAL INFORMATION

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY SERVICES

The Information Technology Services (ITS) department takes care of the computing needs of the University community. Our services range from phone-in support, to desktop management, to network infrastructure, and to enterprise applications work.

The Technology Assistance Center (TAC) is the first point of contact for students, faculty, staff, and others associated with the University to get computer help. Customers can contact TAC via phone, chat, or email; or look for answers on University standard hardware, software, and systems on the web site (www.ferris.edu/techsupport).

To support the educational process, ITS manages the software and hardware on over 5,000 University-owned computer stations located in classrooms, public access labs, and faculty/staff offices. Many of the classrooms also have specialized equipment to aid instruction such as digital projectors, student feedback systems ("clickers"), and multimedia playback and recording systems.

Information Technology Services maintains over 225 servers to run the business of the University community. The main systems include FerrisConnect, the on-line learning/course management system; MyFSU, the campus portal system; and Banner, the University records system. Blackboard hosts fully online courses for students all over the world, and provides the tools to enhance student learning and assessment for many on-campus courses as well.

Computers all across campus can access the internet and other University services via the high-speed network. Wired and/or wireless access is available in most places on campus, with each of the 3,000 residence hall rooms and campus apartments having at least one wired network jack. ITS also maintains the cable, emergency management, and phone services for the University.

Students and employees can get repairs on their personally owned computers for a nominal charge and purchase Adobe software at significantly reduced prices through the Student Technology Services department, located in the University Center. Students can download five free copies of Microsoft Office on personal devices for use as long as they are actively taking classes. Employees can download one Microsoft Office copy at a reduced cost to install on a personally owned device for business use. Student Technology Services operates the iConnect program where students can have their computers set up to connect to the network for no charge at the start of fall semester.

The ITS Central Office is responsible for overall management of IT, project management, service management, policies, communications, and information security.

Overall, ITS handles approximately 42,000 work tickets a year to address the needs of our customers.

INTRAMURAL AND RECREATIONAL SPORTS

Annually, more than half of the student body participates in organized recreational sports activities, including extensive intramural and club sport programs. Other students participate in informal recreation activities. Ferris provides ample facilities for athletics and recreation, including a Student Recreation Center with pool, weight room, basketball and volleyball courts, and an indoor track; a golf course; a sports complex including full and half-size ice rinks, additional basketball and volleyball courts; racquetball courts and indoor and outdoor tennis courts.

KENDALL COLLEGE OF ART AND DESIGN OF FERRIS STATE UNIVERSITY

Kendall College of Art and Design began in 1928 through a generous endowment provided by Helen M. Kendall as a memorial to her husband, David Wolcott Kendall, known as the Dean of American Furniture Designers. Helen Kendall envisioned a school whose graduates would be leaders in the world of art and design; and throughout its history, Kendall College of Art and Design has prepared generations of students for careers as professional artists and designers. In addition, Kendall College of Art and Design is an active partner with the community, annually providing more than 2,000 children and adults with the opportunity to pursue courses in art and design through one of the richest and most varied continuing studies programs in the United States.

In 1996, the Board of Trustees of Kendall College of Art and Design voted to merge Kendall with Ferris State University, a process that was completed in December 2000. Founded in 1884 as Ferris Industrial School, Ferris State University is dedicated to providing an education that prepares its students for professional careers. Ferris State also seeks, through its educational programs, applied research and expertise, to support and strengthen the economy of Michigan and the nation.

In combining these two distinctive institutions, the Boards of both Kendall and Ferris have forged a union that offers students the educational opportunities and strengths of each institution. At the heart of both institutions is the commitment that graduates are prepared to pursue professional careers. Each institution shares a dedication to educational excellence and innovation coupled with practical application. As partners, the two institutions build upon and expand the unique educational opportunities they offer in world-class programs in art, design, and technology.

As a college within Ferris State University, Kendall College of Art and Design prepares students for leadership in the visual arts, design, art history, and art education; provides innovative, collaborative education that fosters intellectual growth and individual creativity; and promotes awareness of ethical and civic responsibilities of artists and designers, locally and globally.

Kendall College of Art and Design of Ferris State University is committed to the principle of equal opportunity in education and employment. OFFICE OF MULTICULTURAL STUDENT SERVICES

The Office of Multicultural Student Services (OMSS) promotes the intellectual understanding and appreciation of diversity, inclusion and social justice by creating opportunities for learning and leadership development for the campus community. In addition, the office provides meaningful support to assist in the transition, retention, and graduation of underrepresented student populations.

As students matriculate through Ferris, the OMSS staff is committed to supporting our students through our five pillars of service:

Advocacy - OMSS makes every attempt to ensure that our students' college experiences are fair and as rewarding as possible by providing meaningful support.

Leadership Development - Through the T.O.W.E.R.S. Leadership Development Program, OMSS provides development opportunities for students to learn and develop important transferable skills that will assist them in becoming leaders on campus and in their future careers.

Mentorship - OMSS staff provides one-on-one guidance to students and organizations to encourage growth and development and to help them make healthy choices socially and academically.

Cultural Awareness - OMSS sponsors a variety of programs, guest speakers, and discussions to engage the campus community and facilitate student learning as it relates to multiculturalism and inclusion.

College Access - OMSS spreads awareness and creates a college going culture to prospective middle and high school students through the federal and state funded MI GEAR UP/KCP College Day Program.

OMSS coordinates many cultural awareness events throughout the year, listed are just a few: Culture 365 Signature Event Series, Transitions to Success: Minority Freshman Orientation, Cultural Connections Open House, Hispanic Heritage Month Celebration, Native American Heritage Month Celebration, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Celebration, Black History Month Celebration, Women's History Month Celebration, Asian American History Month Celebration, OMSS Minority Graduate Recognition Program, TOWERS Leadership Development Program, and Black Male Network Initiative.

OFFICE OF TRANSFER AND SECONDARY SCHOOL PARTNERSHIPS

The Office of Transfer and Secondary School Partnerships is committed to creating conditions that foster student success and promoting access to higher education and degree attainment by facilitating successful transfer of college and articulated credit. The office offers support and services for community colleges and transfer students through community college agreements, articulation agreements, and transfer guides. For high school students, the office coordinates dual enrollment, concurrent enrollment, articulation, as well as programs to help high school students become college ready through the Center for College Readiness.

RETENTION AND STUDENT SUCCESS

Retention and Student Success is the home for academic support services at Ferris State University. The purpose is to provide developmental courses, educational counseling, and academic support services that will empower students enrolled at Ferris State University to achieve their educational and career goals.

STUDENT AFFAIRS

The division of Student Affairs provides a variety of programs and services for students through the following departments: Birkam Health and Counseling Center, Center for Leadership, Activities and Career Services, Admissions, Registrar's Office, Financial Aid, Institutional Research and Testing, Enrollment Services, Office of Multicultural Student Services, Student Conduct, Student Employment, Student Life, University Center, and University Recreation. These departments promote, support and complement the mission of the institution by working collaboratively with students, faculty, staff and the surrounding communities to facilitate opportunities for students to access higher education and participate in student-centered learning through diverse experiences that support student engagement, retention and graduation.

STUDENT EMPLOYMENT

The Student Employment Office is located in the Timme Center for Student Services. Its goal is to assist students in finding part-time employment that will provide income while attending Ferris, as well as help them learn transitional skills that will benefit them upon graduation. There are over 2,000 student employees on campus every year. In addition to helping students find jobs on campus, Student Employment offers off-campus job postings for area businesses. The office participates in the Federal Community Service Work Study Program that allows students to work in community-based positions in the area such as the local food pantry, working as a reading tutor for local students, or the local recycling center. Students may also sign up for the Quick Cash program that puts them in touch with local residents who are looking to hire students for odd jobs such as yard work, painting, etc. More information on Student Employment can be found at http://www.ferris.edu/HTMLS/admision/financialaid/employment/index.htm

FERRIS BUILDINGS AND POINTS OF INTEREST

Alumni Building (1929) - The oldest building on campus and the only building to survive the fire in 1950, the Alumni Building houses the University Archives and Extended and International Operations, which administers Ferris Statewide, Ferris Online, Conference and Professional Services, Office of International Education, Entrepreneurship Institute, Academic Incubator, and the doctorate program in Community College Leadership. Classrooms and faculty offices for the College of Arts and Sciences are also in this building.

Arts and Sciences Commons (1996) - This building houses Arts and Sciences faculty and administrative offices, Retention & Student Success faculty and administrative offices, the Academic Support Center, the Shimadzu Core Laboratory for Academic and Research Excellence, the Card Wildlife Education Center, and the Writing Center, which provides peer tutoring to assist students with writing and study skills. The building also features "The Visionary," a mural - one of the largest of its type in the world - depicting the history of FSU. The Arts and Sciences Commons structure connects the Science and Starr Buildings.

Automotive Center (1956) - The Automotive Center (formerly Technical and Applied Arts Center) comprises the instructional and lecture facilities for Automotive Services, Automotive Management and Automotive Engineering Technology.

Birkam Health Center (1959) - This building houses the Birkam Health Center as well as the Counseling Center to provide a wide variety of health care and mental health services. It is also the home of the Office of Student Conduct.

Bishop Hall/College of Education & Human Services (1967) - Built as a residence hall, Bishop Hall/College of Education was remodeled in 1986 to house the College of Education & Human Services administrative offices and classrooms. Tot's Place is also located in this building.

Business Building (1970) - The College of Business houses regular and team-based classrooms and computer labs (Mac, PC, Networking, Security, and Imaging & Media Production), as well as administrative and faculty offices. The facility also includes a recently renovated auditorium that accommodates in excess of 200.

Creative Arts Center (1965) - This building houses the studios, classrooms, and faculty offices needed for the Studio Arts in the College of Arts and Sciences.

Ewigleben Sports Complex/Ice Arena (1974) - This building comprises of two indoor ice rinks and a recreational wing with facilities for intercollegiate hockey, recreational hockey and skating, basketball, and volleyball, all completed in 1975. An addition completed in 1981 includes fitness and sportsmedicine facilities and a volleyball arena.

Ferris Library for Information, Technology, and Education(FLITE) (2001) - Located in the heart of the main campus, FLITE features a variety of work and study spaces, including an information commons, 4 instructional studios, 8 seminar rooms, 56 individual and group study rooms, a reading room, an extended-hours study area, and the FCTL Learn Lab, all with wireless access capability. The building has a total seating capacity of 1,300 and provides access to 172 public computers. FLITE provides access to over 81,000 periodicals, most of which are accessed online, and houses over 250,000 volumes. FLITE also provides access to over 200,000 e-books. FLITE librarians taught over 500 instruction sessions in fall 2014 for Ferris students. Additionally, FLITE librarians bring library instruction to campus students around the state. FLITE is a U.S. Government Documents Depository, a Patent and Trademark Depository Library for Western Lower Michigan, and a depository for the U.S. Bureau of the Census. FLITE is the home to several other university departments such as the Faculty Center for Teaching and Learning, the Office of Multicultural Student Services, Media Production, and The Jim Crow Museum of Racist Memorabilia.

First Lady's Attic (2009) - Ferris State University is committed to providing opportunities for its students, including the opportunity to get professional clothing for a job, internship interview or class presentation at the First Lady's Attic, located in the University Center. Founded in 2009 by Patsy Eisler, the First Lady's Attic accepts donations of professional clothing from alumni, staff and community members. A Ferris student can pick up an outfit for their interview free of charge. It is theirs to keep. The First Lady's Attic ensures that all Ferris students are dressed appropriately for success. The Attic is managed by the Diversity and Inclusion Office. For more information please visit http://www.ferris.edu/flattic/.

G. Mennen Williams Auditorium (1961) - This facility houses FSU's theater program and also serves as the major multipurpose auditorium for the FSU campus. With seating for 1,644, Williams Auditorium hosts musical, dramatic, cultural, and convocation events throughout the year. It also is available for public rental use when scheduling allows.

Granger Center for Construction & HVACR (2003) - The Granger Center for Construction and HVACR is a state-of-the-art facility - an interactive learning center where all structural steel, process piping, mechanical systems, and electrical systems are exposed or visible behind glass. The Center focuses on both theory and application. Its laboratory facilities provide a practical, "hands-on" experience using an extensive array of sophisticated up-to-date equipment devoted to testing and solving problems students are likely to encounter in the field.

Heavy Equipment Center (1987) - This 53,000-square-foot building accommodates students in the 2- and 4-year Heavy Equipment Technology programs. The HEC building is the largest facility in the country dedicated to educate and train graduates for entry into the heavy equipment industry workforce. Additionally, it is home to the Heavy Equipment Service Engineering Technology B.S. Degree, the only one of its kind in the U.S.

Interdisciplinary Resource Center (1969) - This building contains one large lecture hall seating 120, five classrooms with state-of-the-art teaching technology seating 30-50, television studios, the Center for Latino Studies, and the Office of International Education (that includes one computer classroom). The second floor houses faculty from the College of Business.

Jim Crow Museum (est. 2006) - The Jim Crow Museum is a national and international resource for individuals and groups interested in learning more about race, race relations, and racism. Located in the lower level of FLITE, the museum is this nation's largest publicly accessible collection of racial- and segregation-based artifacts. The museum is FREE to the public and features six exhibit areas—who and what is Jim Crow, Jim Crow Violence, Jim Crow and Anti-Black Imagery, Battling Jim Crow Imagery, Attacking Jim Crow Segregation, and Beyond Jim Crow. The museum also offers a comprehensive timeline of the African American experience in the United States. The timeline is divided into sections: Africa before Slavery, Slavery in America, Reconstruction, Jim Crow, Civil Rights and Post Civil Rights.

Regular hours are Monday through Friday 12-5 p.m. To schedule a group tour please contact Lisa Kemmis at (231) 591-5873 or at imcrowmuseum@ferris.edu. Please refer to the calendar of events for availability. Visitors to the Jim Crow Museum are prohibited from photographing or video recording any portions of the museum. Exceptions to this policy can be made at the sole discretion of museum staff and might include special events, scholars who have made arrangements in advance of their visits, and credentialed members of the press. Note: Because many of the museum's artifacts and media pieces contain explicit images of violence, nudity, offensive language, and other mature themes, the museum is recommended for those 12 years of age and older.

Katke Golf Course (est. 1975) - This course offers 21 holes of championship golf. The original 18-hole course is a par 72 measuring 6,967 yards from the Black tees, 6,317 from the Crimson tees, 5,648 from the Silver tees and 4,752 from the Gold tees. Katke also features a "Family Tee" for juniors and new golfers. The D.O.G. Tee or *Developing Original Golfers* Tee allows new golfers the ability to play with more experienced players.

Katke's award-winning practice facility features three practice holes (#19, #20 and #21), 100,000 square feet of natural grass teeing space, six target greens, a short game area for pitching, chipping, and bunker play and multiple putting greens.

The Katke Clubhouse sits atop the highest point in Mecosta County with excellent views of the county to the west and of the FSU Campus to the east. The clubhouse provides full-service amenities including a fully stocked Golf Pro Shop, men's and women's locker rooms, Founders Grill which features a variety of food and beverage options, and a Multi-Purpose Room with seating for up to 50 guests, perfect for business meetings or small parties.

PGA Professional Staff is available daily providing all of the needed services for golf-outing events, tournament needs, golf instruction and clinics, and custom club fitting.

The golf course is conveniently located adjacent to the Holiday Inn Hotel and Conference Center.

McKessy House (1989) - McKessy House, resembling an Old English cottage on Cedar Street, north of Williams Auditorium, was purchased by Ferris State University in 1989 as a result of a generous gift from Gerald McKessy, a 1929 graduate of Ferris's college-preparatory program who went on to graduate from the Detroit College of Law in 1933. Mr. McKessy was a charter member of the Presidents Club, a member of the Phoenix Society, a founding father of the Alumni Foundation, a 12-year member of the Board of Directors of the Alumni Association, and a recipient of the Distinguished Alumnus Award in 1971 for the generous donation of his time and talents to Ferris State University. Mr. McKessy donated stock, the proceeds of which were used to buy the house, storage barn, and two acres that are now utilized as parking and additional Arts and Sciences classroom space. Mr. McKessy's gift also made it possible to remodel the house which is currently occupied by the division of Governmental Relations and General Counsel. This division is responsible for governmental and community relations, legal affairs, equal opportunity, and labor relations.

Michigan Art Walk (1996) - The Michigan Art Walk is an ongoing project whereby original pieces of art work created by Michigan artists are installed throughout campus and linked by a meandering pathway, ultimately reaching into the Big Rapids community. The inaugural sculpture of the Michigan Art Walk, by Ann Arbor-based artist Barron Naegel, was installed in the fall of 1996. Also installed in the fall of 1996 were a wall sculpture by Daniel Roache, under the auspices of the Presidential Art Collection, and the main panel of Robert Barnum's "The Visionary," which depicts the history of Ferris State University. The unveiling of "Escape," an outdoor sculpture by R. Farrington Sharp, on October 17, 1997 continued the project, along with the side panels of "The Visionary" which were unveiled on February 20, 1998, completing Barnum's triptych. "Totem Stack," a sculpture by Ferndale artist Albert Young, was unveiled on May 7, 1998. "Muse" by Irina A. Koukhanova, was dedicated on November 19, 1998, and sculptor Fritz Olsen's "Ripples" was unveiled November 19, 1999. Lois Teicher's functional piece, "Bench with Three Deep Seats," was dedicated on June 14, 2000. "Ferris Arch," a limestone sculpture by Kenneth Thompson, was dedicated October 10, 2001. Mark Chatterley's "Journey to the Body Collective," a flying wall sculpture located in the reading room at FLITE, was dedicated on October 29, 2002. Robert Barnum's "Of Thought and Reason," a 130-foot-long, 10-foot-tall painting on canvas located in FLITE's Extended Study Area was unveiled on August 28, 2003. Ray Katz's "Celebration," a large-scale metal sculpture, was unveiled September 3, 2004. The "TO STRIVE, TO SEEK, TO FIND" sculpture is dedicated to the 125th anniversary of FSU. The sculpture was created in a partnership between Ferris Fine Arts and the campus Welding Engineering Technology Program and was funded under the FSU Festival of the Arts. Important comments, quotes or sayings about Ferris are cut into the figure form support plates redefining viewer response and increasing level of content. The Art Walk pieces can be viewed on the Ferris website along with information about the artists.

Michigan College of Optometry (2011) - This state-of-the-art 87,000-square-foot building is the University's first Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Gold certified building. The Michigan College of Optometry building's first floor is home to the University Eye Center, which provides eye health and vision care services to the public and University community, as well as specialty eye and vision care to patients from all over the state of Michigan, as part of its mission to provide excellent clinical education for students of the college.

Music Center (1962) - The Music Center is located in the heart of the campus at the foot of the Carillon Clock Tower on the south end of the quad "green space" and just north of Top Taggart Field (football stadium). This facility offers rehearsal and practice space for all varieties of ensembles. The band room can accommodate groups of up to 100 musicians and the Choral Room provides room for 60 musicians. Private practice rooms are available and are ideal for individual practice or small groups of 2-3 people. Each practice room contains an acoustic piano. The Humanities Department maintains these instruments (regular tuning, etc.) as a service to currently enrolled students. The piano lab has 15 stations (full-size digital pianos) which are used for group instruction and practice for those enrolled in music classes. The music faculty and ensemble director's offices are also in the Music Center.

National Elastomer Center for Plastics and Rubber Technology (1987) - The Ferris Plastics and Rubber program is the largest and most respected undergraduate program of its kind in the United States. The Plastics B.S. program was started in 1982 and continues to fill a great need in the growing plastics industry for technically trained personnel. Ferris graduates gain immediate status as recognized technical leaders. This innovative program provides students with a background that includes topics such as processing, material testing and properties, and mold and product design. Classes emphasize hands-on learning, using the same type of equipment that is currently used in the industry. The plastics building was expanded in 1998, and renamed the "National Elastomer Center" to include educational space for the new rubber degrees. The rubber program is a unique educational experience with graduates being sought after by the rubber industry. Coursework follows the original plastics degree in processing, testing, and design but also includes rubber compounding. The plastics and rubber industry has shown support for the Ferris programs by sponsoring the construction of the Plastics Building in 1987 and the expansion in 1998 with funding for equipment and supplies, providing job experience by employing our students for summer internships and finally hiring our graduates.

Pharmacy Building (1972) - Designed to house all on-campus operations of the College of Pharmacy, this building includes specialized laboratories and the Ferris Pharmacy Care Clinic as well as an antique pharmacy exhibit.

Presidential Art Collection (1996) - Daniel Roache was chosen as the first contributor for a collection featuring commissioned works by Michigan artists honoring Ferris presidents. His aluminum, wall-mounted sculpture representing the seven (at that time) academic colleges hangs in the Williams Auditorium lobby. A bronze bust of President Byron Brophy by Midland sculptors James S. Hopfensperger and Joan Hopfensperger-Most was dedicated on April 30, 1999. It is on display in the Ferris Library for Information, Technology, and Education (FLITE).

Quad Café (2015) - The Quad Café includes an All-You-Care-To-Eat Marché Style Dining section where our cooks prepare fresh foods in the Exhibition Style of cooking and a unique retail dining section with options including, but not limited to: burgers, pizza, frozen yogurt, crepes, as well as "value menus." The Quad Café offers a take-out option along with a variety of seating arrangements that include small individual areas as well as family-style seating, most with an outstanding view of the central campus quad. The "Tapingo" mobile app allows patrons to order and pay for their selections in advance. Conferences, meetings, receptions, and banquets are all hosted by the award winning Catering Division and customized. For more details call: (231) 591-2605.

Racquet Facility (acquired in 1980) - The facility offers four indoor tennis courts, 10 outdoor hard courts, four 36' eight year old and under courts, one 60' ten year old and under court, three indoor racquetball courts, cardiovascular and free-weight equipment, aerobic and fitness classes, tanning booths, tennis lessons, clinics and league programs, rental equipment and a full-service tennis pro shop. This facility serves intercollegiate athletes, the club tennis team, faculty/staff, students, the general public, and as a laboratory for the Professional Tennis Management program.

Rock Café (2008) - The Rock Café incorporates European-style marketplace décor where cooking aromas, product freshness, and abundance are prevalent. An emphasis is placed on food merchandising, and also includes casual Café-style seating. Marketplace concepts, also referred to as Marché concepts or food emporiums, are the new generation in student dining. A marketplace concept provides an integrated food production and dining experience with an emphasis on fresh ingredients and made-to-order preparation. It is characterized by exhibition cooking at several distinct food platforms. Students today want an element of entertainment with their dining experience, a concept we call "eatertainment." A marketplace concepts offers this as food becomes the "star" and the staff is on "stage."

Science Building (1956) - Remodeled and expanded in 1967 and completely renovated in 1997, this building provides teaching auditoria, classrooms, and science laboratories for the College of Arts and Sciences, as well as the Rawlinson Observatory, John and Rhea Smith Greenhouse, and Reitz Reading Room.

Starr Building (1961) - Completely renovated in 1995, with frequent upgrades, students now enjoy new furnishings, state-of-the-art instructional equipment, multimedia labs, study rooms, and lounges in the Starr Building. It is FSU's largest general classroom building and houses the Educational Counseling and Disabilities Services office and Williams Auditorium, where dozens of live performances and special events are offered each year.

Student Convocation Center/Wink Arena (1999) - This 42,000-square-foot facility, located adjacent to the Ewigleben Ice Arena, seats 2,400, and includes prime sections of chair-back seating. The building complex features an expanded lobby that adjoins the Ice Arena with a pro shop, concession stands, and a display for the Bulldog Hall of Fame. This center serves as the home for the FSU men's and women's basketball programs, and is also used for commencement ceremonies, major concerts, and special events.

Student Recreation Center (1998) - The former HPE/Wink Arena building was remodeled and reopened August 30, 1998. The facility gives students, faculty, staff, and community members a modern gymnasium, weight room, aerobic rooms, exercise machines, elevated track, 40-foot climbing wall, and indoor swimming pool.

Swan Technical Center (1966) - This building contains many classrooms and laboratories designed specifically for engineering and engineering-technology instruction. The building also contains the administrative offices of several College of Engineering Technology programs.

Timme Center for Student Services (CSS) (1967) (Renovated 2002) - As the official "welcome center" for the University, the Timme Center for Student Services (CSS) serves as a one-stop service center in which students can register for classes, obtain financial aid and housing information, request transcripts, pay bills, and inquire about student employment opportunities. Highlights of Timme CSS include a glass atrium that extends the full height of the eastern side of the building and a second atrium facing State Street, providing natural sunlight and openness for the building. Formerly the campus library, the Timme CSS is a place of diversity, art, history and service. The first floor houses the Financial Aid, Business, and Student Employment offices; the offices of Admissions and Records, Enrollment Services, Academic Senate, and Institutional Research are on the second floor. The third floor features a display of Ferris historical memorabilia, as well as houses the offices of the President, Provost & Vice President for Academic Affairs, Vice President for Student Affairs, Vice President for Diversity and Inclusion, Budgetary Planning and Analysis, and Testing. The carefully chosen combination of offices and services provides a wonderful welcome to all constituents in the middle of campus.

Tot's Place (instituted 1987) - Located on the first floor of Bishop Hall, Tot's Place Child Development Center is a nationally accredited full service child care center providing educational programs for children of FSU students, faculty/staff, and the surrounding community. Tot's Place also serves as a laboratory for many FSU academic programs.

University Center (2015) - The new University Center was formerly known as the Rankin Student Center. The updated facility provides a wide variety of services and activities to meet the needs of students, faculty, staff and guests of the University. The center offers an updated any time dining service with a retail component, Starbucks Coffee Shop, Barnes & Noble Bookstore, fine arts gallery, the First Lady's Attic, several multi-purpose meeting rooms, a ballroom, the Rankin Atrium, commuter lounge and study lounge with computers and printing capabilities. Also, there are several lounges that provide comfortable areas for studying, relaxing and social engagement. Offices for student organizations include The Student Government of FSU, Entertainment Unlimited (programming board) and Veteran's Association. On the administrative side, the offices include the Dean of Student Life, Center for Leadership, Activities and Career Services, Catering Services, University Center and Student Technology Services.

Victor F. Spathelf Center for Allied Health (1979) - This four-level structure contains the specialized classrooms, laboratories, and offices for the students, faculty and administration of the College of Health Professions.







PERCENT OF STUDENTS BY COLLEGE FALL SEMESTER 2015








FALL TO FALL FIRST-YEAR RETENTION RATES (Full-Time FTIACS)


Students Enrolled in 2 & 4 Yr Programs





You will drive past Big Boy Restaurant (which is on your right). Turn left at the next stoplight (Perry Street), which is the main entrance to campus.

Driving from North (Cadillac): US-131 South to Big Rapids, Exit 139. Turn left and follow Perry Street 1.7 miles to the last stop light which is State Street (Business Loop-131). Proceed straight through the stoplight into the main campus.

Driving from North (Old US-131): Continue on Old US-131 (which is State Street), stay in the left lane. You will drive past Big Boy Restaurant (which is on your right). Turn left at the next stoplight (Perry Street), which is the main entrance to campus.

Driving from South (Grand Rapids and Kalamazoo): US-131 North to Big Rapids, Exit 139. Turn right and follow Perry Street 1.7 miles to the last stop light which is State Street (Business Loop-131). Proceed straight through the stoplight into the main campus.

Driving from West: Take M-20 East to Stanwood and then US-131 North to Big Rapids, exit 139. Turn right and follow Perry Street 1.7 miles to the last stop light which is State Street (Business Loop-131). Proceed straight through the stoplight into the main campus.



Annual Room and Board Costs FY 2016



Annual Tuition and Required Fees FY 2016




Financial Aid as % of Total General Fund Spending FY 2015


Full Year-Equated Students FY 2015




