Creating Significant Learning Experiences

New faculty at Ferris State University and Kendall College of Art and Design of Ferris State University find themselves on the other side of the desk during New Faculty Orientation Week (NFOW), held for one week each August.

Just as a freshman is new to the university's campus, so are some of the school's faculty before the first day of classes begin. So, NFOW serves the same purpose for faculty as freshman orientation does for first-time Ferris students: it acclimates them to Ferris State's campus environment.

"New Faculty Orientation Week provides the Faculty Center for Teaching and Learning the opportunity to help new faculty have a smooth transition into the campus community," Faculty Center for Teaching and Learning (FCTL) Director Todd Stanislav says. "This helps us identify for them what's important at the university and build relationships from day one."

There is a lot to learn about the university's culture, people and students, Stanislav adds, saying he likens NFOW to L. Dee Fink's concept of "Creating Significant Learning Experiences."

"In making New Faculty Orientation Week a rich experience for new faculty, they in turn can provide significant learning experiences for their students once they enter the classroom," he says.

"We're asking ourselves, 'What can we do to help faculty be successful in the classroom?'"

Meegan Lillis explains NFOW provides the FCTL the opportunity to identify campus resources for faculty. There are not only resources through the FCTL, but across campus, that enhance a faculty member's ability to create significant learning experiences for students, the FCTL instructional technologist says. For example, NFOW introduces new faculty to FLITE, Student Services, University College, and Educational Counseling and Disability Services, among a number of other resources.

"New Faculty Orientation Week brings all of these experiences together versus faculty having to dig them up on their own," Lillis says.

Stanislav points out another bonus to NFOW is that all sessions held throughout the week are led by current faculty.

"When you peel back the layers, you realize we're utilizing the expertise and diversity of our campus," he says.

But the learning process does not stop at NFOW for new faculty. Bea Griffith-Cooper, FCTL instructional designer, notes NFOW as the first step in creating a support network for faculty. After faculty begin teaching at Ferris, they participate in the New Faculty Transition Program throughout their first year on campus. The FCTL also provides a myriad of resources for faculty whether they are new or not.

"So much is changing on the higher education landscape that other faculty are more than welcome to participate in NFOW, from learning about new things on campus to mentoring a new faculty member," Griffith-Cooper says."We encourage faculty to get involved."

Lillis adds there also are a variety of programs sponsored by the FCTL that are open to all faculty. Weekly, one-hour sessions are held from 5 to 6 p.m. on Tuesdays and noon to 1 p.m. on Thursdays that cover everything from academic dishonesty to PowerPoint presentations. Additionally, such services as Small Group Instructional Diagnosis (SGID) is available for faculty wishing to gather feedback during the semester about how well students are responding to current courses.

Griffith-Cooper uses a metaphor when describing the SGID. "Faculty should look at this like a road map," she says. "She asks, 'What's the destination and where do you want to stop along the way?' This creates a great resource to help faculty achieve success in the classroom."
